CARE MANAGER REPORT

Welcome to winter with no rain in sight. We're still having some sunshine to make us feel ok. The coughs, colds and flus are hitting hard this winter. We have had some staff wearing masks intermittently to keep all the residents cold free. It is greatly appreciated the staff do this for the residents' protection. All residents and many staff have had the flu injection given by Dr. Oleg. The take up of this offer is always very good.

We are excited to welcome back personal carer Mon Humphrey (Livingston) from maternity leave and Tiff Talty has returned to our domestic team. Angelica Hisola has also joined the domestic team and Rachael Chalinor has come on board as a personal carer. We wish them all the best.

All residents will have been advised of My Medicare. This is the new subsidy that GPs can access if they visit Residential Aged Care Facilities. Each resident will nominate their GP, which is usually Dr. Oleg. This will be on the form the clinic has provided for us to get signed. Once this form is accepted by My Medicare, each time a resident is seen at a hospital or by another doctor, the information from the visit will be sent to Dr. Oleg. This will assist Dr. Oleg regarding issues someone may have had whilst on leave or off for any period. This is no cost to residents.

The Royal Flying Doctor optometrist will be making a visit to us in July. However, there are only 9 appointments available. Stephanie from the RFDS was hoping to have more appointments available too. We will have to prioritise this list. Not ideal but necessary.

Audiologist Campbell will be attending in June but again with limited appointments available. Again, priority will need to occur.

Dietician Caroline Wydro from Plena Health made a visit last month. Caroline saw 8 residents who had weight loss concerns and reviewed our Autumn menu. Caroline has given us several ideas on how to improve our nutrition and hydration provisions. We will be working hard on this over the next two months. We know we have good food, but she wants us to have even more nutritious food. Medication reviews have been very much on our agenda over the last few months. The Geriatricians through Geri-connect and Lai Yap the external pharmacist have been completing thorough reviews on most residents' medications to make sure they have the appropriate medications for their best health outcomes. Dr. Oleg is then able to make changes with the recommendations and continue to prescribe.

Goodwin Village prides itself on accessing as many different health services as we can to provide professional input to the health and wellbeing of residents.

BOARD NEWS

RESIDENTIAL CARE - The residential care facility is currently fully occupied, there is some availability for respite in June.

<u>24 HOURS 7 DAYS A WEEK REGISTERED NURSING</u> – With Anu leaving our Registered Nurse coverage has remained at around 80 per cent for April 2024. We are still advertising for RNs and looking to build the percentage and eventually get to the 100 per cent?

NURSING & CARE POSITIONS AVAILABLE - We are always looking for staff. Our focus is trying to appoint some more RNs. We would like to find some more Registered Nurses to take a team leadership role on the 'floor'. As a few of our care staff have indicated they are approaching retirement, we are also looking for more personal carers.

POLICIES & PROCEDURES - The way Goodwin Village operates is governed by policies and procedures often in response to government rules and legislation. If any residents or their families are wanting to view any of these policies and procedures at any time, they are welcome.

RESIDENT ADVISORY BODY – The Government requires that we have a Resident Advisory body in place made up of residential care residents, so they have input into decisions that affect them. This Body has had several meetings and is meeting each month and providing reports to other meetings including the Board.

ENTERPRISE AGREEMENTS - Our Enterprise Agreement negotiations are continuing. We were hoping to have the Agreement voted on by the end of April but unfortunately the Victorian State negotiations with the AMNF have slowed progress on our Agreement down.

<u>NEW RETIREMENT UNITS</u> – The Goodwin Village Board has resolved to build 2 new retirement units. We are currently waiting for the required permits, and construction should commence mid-year.

Goodwin Village has a range of retirement units and there will be a new one built in 2024. Features of this Units will include:

- 105 square metre unit
- Plus 45 square metre 2 x car lock up garage
- Living area facing north
- No steps in the Unit
- Split system air conditioning in living & master bedroom
- Ensuite to master bedroom.
- Concrete path all the way around the Unit.
- All maintenance of grounds provided
- Waiting list priority into residential care, and new residential wing if required



- Investigation into incident is completed.
- Open disclosure is completed.
- Outcome of incident and recommendations are communicated to Board, staff, residents, and their representatives.
